## **Notification of Nominee for District Governor 2008-2009**

The Nominating Committee for District Governor interviewed eligible candidates for the position of District Governor on Monday 3 April 2006.

The Nomination Committee has notified me that Wayne Morris of the Rotary Club of Honiara has been selected as District Governor-nominee for the rotary year 2008-2009.

I am now formally notifying all Clubs in our District of the candidate selected as required by the relevant RI BYLAW in the Manual of Procedure 2004.

Similarly, the RI BYLAWS provides for 'Challenging Candidates' and 'Concurrence to Challenges'.

Accordingly, I advise that any challenge must be received by me no later than Friday 21 April 2006, and must comply with the procedural requirements specified in the RI BYLAWS.

In the absence of a Challenging Candidate I shall declare that Wayne Morris to be the Governor-nominee for 2008-2009.

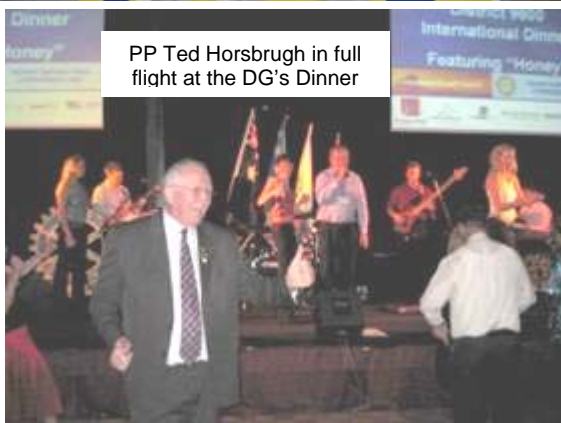

## **INTERNATIONAL CONVENTIONS**

**The following is of interest to Australian Rotarians.**

### **The RI Board:**

- agrees to proceed with the tentative selection of Seoul, Korea as the host for the 2009 RI Convention on 20-24 June 2009, subject to the general secretary's successful negotiation of an appropriate block of hotels rooms, and adequate space in which to hold all convention activities;
- agrees that the tentative selection of Seoul is still subject to a thorough review of the tax implications of holding the convention in Seoul, Korea;
- requests the general secretary to proceed to contract ITS as the hotel reservation agent for the 2009 (Seoul) RI Convention;
- tentatively selects Sydney, Australia as the host for the 2014 RI Convention subject to the general secretary's successful negotiation of an appropriate block of hotel rooms, adequate space in which to hold all convention activities, and any other agreements necessary to memorialise the proposal from the host area as evidenced by a new 2014 proposal from Sydney;
- requests the general secretary to contact the Rotarians and tourism offices in Sydney, Australia and Seoul, Korea to inform them of the Board's decisions regarding Sydney and Seoul;
- requests the general secretary to provide additional status reports on the 2009 (Seoul) RI Convention and the 2014 (Sydney) Convention at its November 2006 meeting.

## SCHOLARSHIPS TO THE WORLD

The Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarship program is the world's largest, privately-funded international scholarship program with about 1,100 scholarships worth up to US\$25,000 each awarded every year.

### Working Together RAM in Solomon Islands

National Rotarians Against Malaria have initiated a USD200,000 Health Hunger and Humanity 3-H Grant application to The Rotary Foundation to continue the very successful previous malaria work in Solomon Islands. The Rotary Club of Honiara has embraced the proposal which will focus on Guadalcanal where the malaria incidence is in excess of 300 cases per 1000 population per year.

Several Australian Districts have expressed keen interest in being involved with funding plus support through Project Volunteers to build malaria clinics. Whilst some work is in forward planning the actual application is in its infancy as it now awaits approval by the Trustees of Our Rotary Foundation for the application to progress to the next stage.

In the interim please continue your support with your contributions to the Annual Programs Fund of Our Rotary Foundation through the Every Rotarian Every Year program.

## **Extract from DG Glen Kinross' Newsletter.**

### **Conference 1974**

The weekend of 22nd - 24th March loomed large. The Thursday preceding the conference looked disastrous. It was raining heavily in Maryborough, another cyclone was just off the coast, but miraculously Friday morning brought sunshine and clear weather. People from all parts of the district began to arrive and the conference opened on schedule at 2 p.m. with 625 people in attendance for the opening ceremony. I am happy to report that every club in the mainland part of our district was represented and three of the PNG Clubs.

The conference had its high notes and the high notes for each person were not the same. One thing was certain - the chords of unanimity and purpose could be heard throughout. For some, the Presentation of Flags and narration by P.D.G. and Past Director of R.I. Clem Renouf held special significance, as indeed it did for me. For others it was the contribution brought by R.I. President Bill Carter's Special Representative, Jim Bennett, from North Wales. For some, the address "Australia - Improving its Quality of Life" by Rt. Hon. J.D. Anthony, for others, the address "What Should be the Aim", by D.G.N. Ray Sadler, or the address "Projects, Projects, Projects" by P.P. Brian Eggleton had particular appeal and inspiration for them. Jim Bennett had a special word of praise for Brian Eggleton's address, and I remind you here that it and all of the other addresses will be available on tape in the near future.

There were those whose dedication to Rotary was spelled out at the conference by their participation in practical terms in F.A.I.M., work teams and World Community Service projects. For them "Rotary is International - Is your Club?" by P.D.G. Brian Knowles, or "Whose Unfortunate Neighbour are we?" by P.P. Doug Keen and P.P. Frank Heaton would have been of special significance.

So one could continue reviewing the total programme, segment by segment, and I trust it will be fully reported to each club by those members who attended.

Rotary is fellowship and service. A conference wouldn't be a conference without its fellowship activities. Will you ever forget the Music Hall Dinner and the Country and Western Barbecue? The Maryborough people are great hosts, hospitable to the point of excellence. They planned it so with all of us as their special guests for the weekend. I have never before experienced such co-operation and helpfulness as was shown by the Rotarians and Rotaryannes of the host clubs over an extended period of months leading up to the conference. The conference was a memorable success and it was because so many people gave of their best effort to make it so.

## **BRIGIDINE COLLEGE ACCEPTS CHALLENGE**

The recent UQ/Rotary Science and Engineering Challenge saw about 500 Year 9 and 10 students from twelve schools in the Brisbane area, competing in activities which tested their natural ability with mathematical and scientific issues. Most importantly, all the students found that these subjects could be fun and they were not as hard as they thought.

Brigidine College was one of the secondary schools to accept the Challenge and came out the overall winner. However all students thought they were winners as they spent a day away from the classroom and their teams of four addressed eight challenges over the day. These included such exciting subjects as ElectraCity, Back to the Future, HeloRescue or Escape from the Lost World, which required the students to build a helium-filled balloon flying machine and fly it through a maze. The climax of the Challenge was testing the bridge sections to destruction and identifying the top scores.

The Challenge is a new community partnership between Rotary Clubs in the western suburbs and the University of Queensland to address the decline in students enrolling in the enabling subjects for science and engineering. A Rotary Dinner hosted by St Lucia Rotary introduced the sponsors and volunteers from Rotary, Young Engineers and Young Scientists to the program. The concept was developed by the University of Newcastle and is being adopted across Australia with the support of governments, private industry, Rotary Clubs and Engineers Australia. The two top schools in the Challenge go to a Super State Challenge in Toowoomba in August with the possibility of qualifying for the Grand National Challenge in Newcastle in November.

# District 9600 Governor's Newsletter — April 2006

## Col's Comments

When the February returns closed on 17 March there were 30 clubs still missing out of 72. Why does this always happen? There were 30 for each of August and September, 31 in October, 28 in November, and 29 in December and January.

As of today, 17 April, there have been 15 further reports (some arriving "naturally" and others chased), thus resulting in the 15 "No Returns" for February as listed opposite. There are still nine clubs yet to report for January, six for December, five for November and four for as far back as October (one in SI and three in PNG).

Assuming no change in membership for the 15 clubs yet to report, the membership at the end of February was 1939, a drop of seven for the month of February and for the year-to-date it is 51 below the "start" figure (end of June 2005) of 1990.

Over the past 10 years the average of the 30 June totals was 2170 and the average of the 28 February totals was 2111, both figures much higher than the present membership but nevertheless reflecting a typical drop of 59 members or 2.7%. This year the equivalent drop is just a little less than that, 2.6%, so the picture is perhaps not quite as bleak as would otherwise appear.

Statistics show that the district membership tends to rise between now and the end of the Rotary Year. It didn't happen last year 2004/05. Can we make it happen this year 2005/06?
