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Michael's Message....

What is the best gift you ever received? Better still, what is the best gift you ever gave? Perhaps you will recall that in each instance, the best gift was one that was tied with the heartstrings of the giver, one that included part of self – Wanda Fulton.

The joy on the faces of the children still tugs at the heart and is something we will never forget – a priceless gift that we received in exchange for being the messenger that delivered the gifts from our Clubs. See Sherryl's article "From a Partner in Service", for more details. (page 3)

Last month we attended the annual Zone Institute that, this year, was held at Broadbeach and, as usual, provided the ideal forum for the 23 Australian Governors and PDG's to network, and for the DGE's and DGN's to be trained. These days, new programs (like Rotary Youth Driver Awareness) want to be recognised as Multi-District activities and we are resisting this because of the increased administration load and the poor record of some of the existing programs. ARCAP for instance is a real worry and much time was spent in discussing a way forward for this troubled company whose constitution may be at odds with RI's Code of Policies. Two Districts have already withdrawn and, of the remaining 21, only two Governors were in favour of it continuing in its present form. We also spent considerable time on RAWCS and, at the AGM of RAWCS Ltd, successfully moved that:

1) Attempts to obtain accreditation for

AusAid cease for the time being,
2) The Constitution be changed to reflect RAWCS proper role as a co-ordinator of the Regions, and to streamline the Board in line with RI Code of Policies,
3) To encourage the Board to introduce a system of funding using interest from a corpus,
4) Promote tax deductibility more effectively.

The AGM's were also held for ROMAC, RDU, and ARHRF where an attempt to cap the corpus at \$20 million failed. Due mainly to falling subscription levels, RDU is having to seriously evaluate itself – the NZ Office has already been sold and studies are underway on whether to relocate the Parramatta Office to a regional area and/or sub-licence Rotary supplies.

The impact of the continuing drought was also on our minds – fodder is no good this time around as most properties are running out of water. So it was considered that a psychological approach may be best – Adopt a Town – for instance a Club could visit a rural community and put on a party/BBQ and so give the locals a good time, lift spirits, aid networking, and of course spend money in the community and help the local economy. Workshops were held on the Council on Legislation, Public Relations (every Club will receive a disc of resources), strategic planning, Club Leadership Plan, and Water Resources. We were also treated to some very interesting speakers like Professors Allan Bond on "Politics and Funding in Modern Australian Science" and Kevin Clements on "Politics of Fear in Peace and Conflict".

The news from Rabaul is of great concern and the 3000 relocated Matupit Islanders are without the means to start a new life in the hills – limited shelter, few tools, and no clean water supply. The District Disaster Committee authorised the immediate transfer of \$5000 to purchase basic tools so that they could build shelters and start food gardens. I also contacted ShelterBox to see if they could assist and last week 100 boxes were packed into containers at DIK for



shipment to Rabaul. This amounts to some \$120,000 worth of aid and means that we must do what we can to support this fantastic program. We now have our very own District ShelterBox, care of the Rotary Club of Pine Rivers Daybreak, so if you want to see what they look like, or help them repack it, give them a call.

At my visits to Clubs, I have been talking about RI President Bill's emphases for 2006-07 (water, health & hunger, literacy and family) and how we must seek continuity, sustainability, and co-operation and it is interesting to note how closely this aligns with the Millennium Goals of UNESCO:

1. Eradicate extreme poverty and hunger
2. Achieve universal primary education
3. Promote gender equality and empower women
4. Reduce child mortality
5. Improve maternal health
6. Combat HIV / AIDS, malaria and other diseases
7. Ensure environmental sustainability
8. Develop a global partnership for development

Rotary is making a difference and *Leading the Way* in doing so!

of Rotary, one of RI President Bill's four emphases and here are some ideas:

Selection of Governor 2009-2010 for Rotary District 9600

In accordance with "Standing Procedures for the Management of the District" nominations are invited from clubs for:

1. Members of the Governor 2009-2010 Nominating Committee.
2. Governor 2009-2010

1) Nominating Committee

Nominations are called for the four elected positions for the Nominating Committee for District Governor. The committee comprises the DG, DGE and IPDG (who shall be Chairman), together with the following elected members:

- (a) A Rotarian who has held the office of Assistant Governor (or prior equivalent) or who has served as Chairman of one of the District Committees established by these Standing Procedures for a full term during the five years prior to nomination to this committee.
- (b) Three Rotarians who have held office for a full term as President of a District 9600 club during the five years prior to nomination to this committee.

The procedure for the selection of these four positions are to be found at District 9600 website under the section entitled "Standing Procedures for the Management of the District" and therefore nominations from District Clubs of suitably qualified and consenting Rotarians are requested. Club nominations for these appointments to the Nominating Committee close with District Governor Michael Gregory on 31 January 2007.

2) District Governor 2009-2010

Nominations are also called for District Governor 2009-2010. The governor is an officer of RI, nominated by clubs of the district, selected by the Nominating committee for District Governor (see left) and elected by the next convention of RI.

Governor-Nominee data forms are available from District Governor Michael Gregory. Nominations by clubs also close by 31 January 2007.

Notes about the composition and process of the nominating committee:

1. Please be aware that there can only be one nomination in each Category from each club. A person may not nominate in both categories. Rotarians with the designation of Past District Governor are not eligible to stand for election in either Category.
2. Following receipt of nominations, District Governor Michael shall then circulate clubs details of all nominations received together with a brief biography of each individual.
3. In the event that more than the required number of nominations are received in either one or both categories, District Governor Michael shall conduct a ballot-by-mail (in accordance with current Rotary International Bylaws), finalising that ballot by the end of February 2007.
4. The nominee(s) gaining the most votes will be elected to the committee. If there are insufficient nominations or a vacancy occurs, District Governor Michael will appoint a qualified Rotarian to fill the vacancy(s). However no member of the District Governor Nominating Committee in any category shall serve on the committee if a candidate for District Governor is from the same club, or is a relative of a candidate (as defined by The Rotary Foundation).
5. Please note that no member of the District Governor Nominating Committee shall be eligible for nomination, that year, as District Governor-Nominee.

From a Partner in Service

The Family of Rotary

As we have moved around the clubs on our official visits, Michael has stressed the importance of keeping a focus on the family of Rotary. It has been lovely to see so many partners at many of the official visits and whole families in some cases, and I thank you for your warm hospitality. It has been good to catch up with so many old Rotary friends and make many new ones.

Literacy Project

Support for my little literacy project has been overwhelming, and I thank all clubs who have donated books or money, and other goods, so generously. The donations have totalled \$650 and the books, puzzles, and other goods (including bed sheets) would have filled several large boxes. All books have been labelled with the Rotary Club who donated them. I would like to tell you where some of these donations have ended up. In September we set off for our official visits to PNG. I packed a large suitcase with as many books and other materials as I could - it was very heavy - and luckily we didn't have to pay excess baggage despite being over the Air Niugini limit! At our first stop in Port Moresby I made a trip to the Koki markets to deliver the bulk of the materials to the Koki preschool (I had purchased additional charts, floor games and alphabet cards from an educational supplier with some of the donated money). Unfortunately the preschool was on school holidays, so I left the goods in the capable hands of Betty at Carol's Koki library next door. Our suitcases were now much lighter but I had saved some books which I gave to President Brian of the Bulolo/Wau club for his primary school, and to Rotarian Maureen in Madang to distribute to preschools in her area.

Our visits in PNG reinforced the need for pre and primary school books, and the extreme importance of promoting literacy of children, in particular of girls and women, and I learnt a lot about donating goods first hand. Other needs became evident, and the usefulness of the materials provided by DIK throughout PNG was again and again reinforced. The stationery supplies (Kits for Kids), the Birthing kits, donated text books are very much appreciated everywhere. In Kimbe, the Rotary Community Corp members said they needed more kits for kids in their area, so I was able to give them \$250 in cash to buy locally, exercise books and other stationery, to deliver to the village schools in need in their area. We had some unforgettable experiences in PNG. Two of them linked us to primary schools and further needs. In Mt Hagen we had a fantastic welcome not only by the Rotary club members and their partners but by children of a highland school dressed in their traditional costumes. The principal of the school presented us with gifts of highland hats and a lovely bilum. At Sikut up in the hills behind Rabaul we made a visit

to a community school and were warmly greeted by staff and students who sang a beautiful thankyou song to the Rotarians in gratitude for two water tanks they have donated to the school. On return, I have organised for a subscription to National Geographic, (A\$59 per year), to be sent to each of these schools and to Carol's Koki library, via the local Rotary Clubs - so that they will have some up to date resources, to investigate the wider world around them. A club may wish to pick up the cost of these subscriptions for subsequent years. There is also a request for a subscription to Readers Digest for Carol's Koki library.

Some bulky items which have been donated to me, I have taken to DIK, and labelled them to be specifically sent to particular areas. Examples are bed sheets donated by Kippa Ring RC (some I took with me to Kokopo), others I have directed to be sent to the Goroka Base Hospital (after a visit we made there - the Goroka RC is doing a lot of good work at the hospital there), and preschool materials from Redcliffe Sunrise (I took most up with me) - I have directed the rest to go to the South Moresby Preschool Association for distribution to several preschools under their control.

Solomon Islands Visit

We are off to the Solomon Islands on 9 December for one week and I will be taking as many of the recent donations of books with me to directly give to schools up there. I may have to leave them with the Rotarians if the schools are on holidays by then. We will be returning to PNG for the forum in May so will have another opportunity to take more books up there then. So the project continues and it is giving me such pleasure on your behalf to deliver these goods. I feel like Santa Claus, and I actually read some of the books on the many flights between destinations in PNG - such wonderful stories. Thankyou once again. Best wishes for a warm family Christmas to all our Rotary family.

Project News Timor Lights Update

In 2005 RC of Brisbane Planetarium sponsored the establishment of a RAWCS project to install solar-powered lighting into villages in West Timor, making life easier for the villagers and encouraging children to do their homework. Chris Wood, a Brisbane-based engineer whose wife Emy grew up in Indonesia, has funded and conducted the installations.

Each lighting set consists of a photovoltaic panel, a "dry" battery (to eliminate acid spills), two high-efficiency fluorescent lights and an electronic controller. The controller regulates the flow of electricity from the panel to the battery and from the battery to the lights, to avoid situations which would reduce battery life below the expected 4 years.

Chris completed the second rollout in West Timor of solar-powered home lighting systems under the project during September and October. The systems replace home-made kerosene lamps and are facilitating homework, cooking and other evening activities in 86 homes in the Amfoang Barat Daya region of West Timor.

Chris is keen to extend the project, but his resources are limited. There is an opportunity for Clubs or individuals to assist with funding, and potential to apply, in conjunction with the Rotary Club of Kupang, for a Rotary matching grant. The work is only moderately labour-intensive, and Chris has trained local people, but there is also limited potential for volunteers.

Promoting Rotary -

Rotary International has requested Rotary clubs and districts to promote Rotary and improve Rotary's public image during 2006-2007 year.

The Rotary Club of Kawana Waters Inc has been blessed by the generous support of local residents, Jessie Burns and her late husband, Noel, over many years.

In June, 2006 the Club accepted Noel and Jessie's valuable sponsorship of an "as constructed" 10 metre wide x 3 metre high (covering 30 square metres) signboard (to 31.12.2007) on an external wall of their "Noel Burns House" commercial building on Nicklin Way at Buddina on the Sunshine Coast. Nicklin Way is a busy 4 lane major road servicing traffic between Mooloolaba (to the north) and Caloundra (to the south).

The signboard, which seeks to achieve RI's objectives, has been manufactured and erected. It is clearly visible to southbound traffic and promotes Rotary International, our district 9600, and the Kawana Waters Rotary Club.

The signboard has been favourably received by neighbouring Rotary Clubs and our District Governor Michael Gregory and the Club is hopeful that some of the positive enquiries now being made may assist it with membership growth.

Australia/New Zealand Student Exchange

In 2007, D9600 will recommence student exchanges with New Zealand. Rotary Clubs in our District are invited to take part in this excellent programme.

The programme is designed to **foster international understanding** between Australian and New Zealanders. Although arranged by Rotary, it is run largely on a family to family basis with assistance from the local Rotary Club. The families directly involved cover all costs.

Students are matched with students of similar interests in the other country.

Young Australians, **aged 13 to 16**, spend one school term of the academic year (March-June, Term 2) living and studying in a New Zealand community as a guest of a New Zealand family. The Australian student's family then host the New Zealand student (who was their host in New Zealand) in their own home and community from June to September (Term 3).

Rotary Clubs provide vital support for this exchange programme by conducting a student interview in the home, and by providing a Counsellor for the Australian student while he/she is in New Zealand (and the matched NZ student while he/she is in Australia). The Counsellor is critical to the success of the programme.

Rotary Clubs may also make a financial contribution (ca \$250) to cover:

- a jacket, polo shirt, badge and business cards for the Australian student
- printing marketing material for the programme

The ANZ Student Exchange Committee is seeking **volunteers** to assist with the implementation and running of this great youth service program. Duties will not be onerous but they will be rewarding and fulfilling! They will make a difference to our young people and our World!

RAWCS Final Report for Project 2 2006-2007 "Worldfish" Center.

I came back to the Solomon's on the 29th August, and returned to Aussie on the 24th October, 2006. I am helping a Company called "Worldfish" with the work they are doing with the local villagers, giving them an alternative to taking all their income off the reef, by growing crays, shrimps, and coming on line over the next couple of years coral, giant clams, and possibly sponges, all under controlled conditions, so it will be sustainable over a long period of time, and, hopefully the reefs may become more populated with some of these things. This will be an ongoing commitment on my behalf to assist them in the future as well.

I am working on the Marketing side of the business for them, and learning everything else on the production side.

Everything went very well there, and I now know how they work, and what they are doing. We went by boat around the villages where they are growing-on aquatic animals for sale, so I have been looking at the "stock" we have in hand at the moment. It is a bit different to what we handle at home, that is for sure. Everything is done by boat, and snorkelling gear is the norm. The principal is the same though, except we are looking at crays and shrimps, instead of cattle.

I spoke to the Exporters in Honiara on the way through, to get their ideas on it, and before I came I emailed some of the buyers around the world, so now I have a full picture of the whole process, and I have done a business plan for the person who will have the future 'depot' to on-sell the animals in the future when "Worldfish" is not able to do it. Their plan is to pass it on to someone there to keep it going indefinitely, and they will assume more of an advisory role, if they are still there in the future, depending on grants etc.

Worldfish is a 'not for profit' organisation, and can't run it as a business, and they may not have the funding to do what they are doing now, setting it up.

The people there are very friendly, and all know what they are doing, and have their job to do, so that is good.

I was able to access the internet there, but it is a bit slow having a capacity of only 28 kps where yours has approximately 500, I think?

I went to the Rotary meetings while I was there, and it was interesting to hear what is happening to all the projects in the melting pot. I discussed with them what project we might do here next year, and have decided to put a team together to work on the School in Gizo itself, both the Primary and High School. We will be replacing water tanks, doing electrical, plumbing, and gas-fitting work, as well as upgrading the classrooms with windows, paint, etc.

Also, I am planning to send a team to Bo Boe to help the local people to rebuild the Medical Clinic there, mainly by supplying

materials they can not afford to buy themselves, such as roofing iron, and sheeting etc.

The weather here is not too different to what it is early in the year, apparently I just missed some terrible weather with strong winds, and rough seas, with heavy rain before I came, although the weather is fine now, and still just as hot as normal.

I am planning to come back in February to work on the above projects, and again in September if possible to try to get some more of the most urgent work done, perhaps in a different area.

I hope this is sufficient report for you on my most interesting trip to the Gizo area. I am happy to report that I achieved what I wanted to do while there, and because there was a chronic shortage of desks in the Primary School, I had some made while I was there to seat 24 children, so that helped a little, and also set a price that we can get desks made there if we decide to do that.

Thank you RAWCS for your support, it is a big help.

Rotary Junior Community Award 10th Anniversary

The Rotary Junior Community Award, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Mitchell River, is celebrating its 10th Anniversary.

The program started in 1997 with 45 successful Awardees from four schools in Bairnsdale. Since then the program has expanded into other clubs with in District 9820, several other districts within Australia and the UK. The program has been translated into Welsh for use in schools in Wales. The program helps young people in their final year in primary school learn about different aspects of their communities, how they can become active and valued members and gives them experience in the role of the volunteer.

On September 16 a nominating committee (drawn from 10 Districts out of WA, SA, Qld and northern NSW) selected PDG John Lawrence from the RC of Brisbane Planetarium as a Director of RI for 2008-2010, to represent Zones 7 & 8 (i.e. Philippines, Australia, NZ and the Pacific).

The RI Board comprises 19 members: The president (Chair), the president-elect, and 17 other directors nominated by the clubs from the zones around the world, each of whom serves a two-year term. A director, although representing a certain zone, is elected at the annual convention by all the clubs, so in fact represents all clubs under the administration of Rotary.

The Board is responsible for directing and controlling the affairs and funds of the international association, exercising control over the current and incoming officers of the association and the committees of RI, and providing general supervision to the member clubs.

Following the expiring of the period of challenge (by other candidates) on 1st December John becomes the sole nominee and will be confirmed as Director 2008-2010 at the forthcoming International Convention in June 2007 at Salt Lake City. John's Rotary experience is well known throughout this District and is described in November's issue of Rotary Down Under (page 47).

Col's Comments

D9600 Membership and Attendance Report September and October 2006

When the October returns closed on 17 November, there were 26 clubs still missing. About average, but disappointing after only 19 the previous month. Seven of these 26 had come in "naturally" by 25 November, and reminder emails were then sent to all of the 19 clubs still outstanding. This had a better than 50% success rate, with 10 more clubs coming good. As of today, 4 December, there remain nine outstanding, each listed in the table opposite as a "No Return". The only clubs yet to provide figures for months prior to October are Kavieng and Madang. It was good to receive "catch-up" figures from Mt Hagen and Wewak.

As previously advised, the end of June figure of 1929 is firm and final, with ALL clubs having reported. The July total (all now in except for Kavieng) is now 1899, representing a fairly normal drop of 30 members for that time of the year. Particularly with four new members now reported by Wewak, August has taken a turn for the better; reported last month as 1901 and now 1907. September and October, as shown opposite, have almost maintained this.

With four months gone in the 2006/07 membership growth stakes, there are four clubs (excluding Gizo which has not yet put in an October return and Wewak where the situation is still a little uncertain) which have registered a net growth of three members. These are:
