

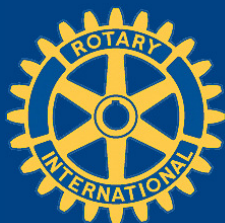

Rotary Meeting 17 October 2011

Chairman Rotarian Greg Burnett opened the meeting with the usual toasts, and extended a warm welcome to 19 members and 18 guests. Greg mentioned that it was a very special day for the Rotary Club of Brisbane as we hosted our first Pride of Workmanship Awards. He then welcomed President Alistair to the rostrum who also welcomed all attendees including two visiting Rotarians, Sharyn Sinclair-Hannocks from Brisbane Highrise and Pat O'Reilly from California.

Alistair also discussed the Membership Dinner to be held Wednesday 19 October at the Brisbane Club. At the time of our Monday meeting there were 42 people attending (including 18 potential new members) and Alistair was hopeful that number would increase to 50.

Alistair then handed back to Chairman Greg who commenced official proceedings for the Pride of Workmanship Awards. Greg mentioned that his decision to join Rotary was influenced by winning one of these awards at Newcastle in 1986. The Pride of Workmanship concept was introduced in 1935 by the Rotary Club of Ryde NSW, and has now been embraced by 600 clubs worldwide. Our inaugural winners were:

Storm the Stage - National Grand Final

Our District 9600 has organised "Storm The Stage", an event in which eighteen of the best young performers from around Australia will perform live on stage! Storm The Stage is a non-profit nationwide opportunity for Australia's most talented up and coming performing artists. After auditions and regional finals held around Australia by Rotary and volunteer industry professionals, eighteen of Australia's finest young Musical Theatre and Drama solo performers converge on the Powerhouse Theatre. Awards of \$11,000 are given for Best Performances in both categories. For the first time, the National Grand Final is being held here in Brisbane with the support of IGA Supermarkets. Come and support Australia's emerging best young talent!

The final is being held on Sun 27 Nov 2011 at the Brisbane Powerhouse, 119 Lamington Terrace, New Farm, commencing at 6.30pm. The cost is \$37 per person and \$29 for pensioners, \$28 Students. However, if we as a club take a block booking of 10 or more it is \$29 each.

In addition, we have been asked if we would be willing to sponsor a student for their stay in Brisbane, at a cost of \$200, which will include paying for their accommodation. If we agree, the student will come and speak to our club after their event to share some of the benefits and happenings of the National Final. Let Alistair know if you think we should proceed.

Speech for Potential New Members

So Welcome to this evening, and I hope you are all having an enjoyable time and have enjoyed hearing about the history of our club.

Before explaining some of the benefits of being a Rotarian, I thought it would be worth briefly relaying the story of how I became involved in Rotary myself, and in that regarding we have one of our current members, Alan Gillespie to either thank or blame, depending on your point of view. I had met Alan a number of times prior to moving to Brisbane 4yrs ago, so when I went to an event shortly after my arrival, and saw Alan, it was only natural that I would say hello. At the time, Alan was chatting with another Rotarian and discussing their respective clubs. I have to admit to thinking at the time that this was some sort of secret handshake society, aka the Monty Python Mason's sketch.

However, Alan suggested that I consider joining, so that night I went home and Googled Rotary. I have to admit I was somewhat disappointed to find out that there was no secret handshake involved, but seeing the work Rotary has achieved, particularly in respect of the PolioPlus program, was phenomenal. I was immediately inspired and at the next opportunity, took Alan up on his invitation to attend a meeting. The rest, as they say is history.

But what may you ask, can Rotary bring to members. Well, for this part of the talk I sought guidance from one of our senior members, Brian Carss. Sadly Brian cannot be here this evening, but for members, I would like to mention he is feeling fine and is hoping to return on Monday. However, I will try and distill some of his insights and for any inaccuracies or misconceptions, I apologise in advance.

For most individuals, there are three main driving forces in one's lifetime as a professional, which can be summarized succinctly as Money, Power and Prestige. As a child and adolescent, one inevitably takes, whether it be from parents, teachers, lecturers or the like. This is not a bad thing, but something we need to do to give us the opportunity to learn the skills we need later on in life.

As one grows older, the driving motivation becomes one of seeking independence, which in professional life involves earning money to support our lifestyle, whether it be a home, car, wife, husband, children, travel etc. However, there comes a time when money is not the important driving force it was earlier, maybe because you have reached some degree of financial security, at which point a quest for power takes over.

Now before you get concerned, I am not talking about some manically laughing evil "bond" villain kind of power, but rather the ability to make things happen. You become aware that being an 'Indian' is not where you can do this, you need to be a 'Chief'. Hence the drive to seek promotion, to become the CEO, the MD, the Director General, or even a Politician??



The third stage in life is one of Prestige, where, all being well, you are recognised for your achievements and for what you have contributed to your profession.

However, it is at the cross-over from Money to Power that Rotary can play an important part in your life. It is here, that you may feel a need to give something back to the Community that supported you during your youth and adolescence, and Rotary is ideally suited to this, as well as being jolly good fun.

So how does Rotary work. Well it is a network of individual clubs with an overriding principle of 'Service above Self'. Each of these clubs can operate independently, but in conjunction, to allow many great achievements to be realized.

Wal has already talked about the history of our club, and its own impact, but to fully appreciate the benefit of Rotary, it is important to look at the achievements more broadly and see what it has achieved globally in its 106 years of operation.

For example, each year Rotary funds approximately 4000 Ambassadorial Scholarships. The purpose of the Ambassadorial Scholarships program is to further international understanding and friendly relations among people of different countries and geographical areas. The program sponsors academic year scholarships for undergraduate and graduate students as well as for qualified professionals pursuing vocational studies. While abroad, scholars serve as goodwill ambassadors to the host country and give presentations about their homelands to Rotary clubs and other groups. Upon returning home, scholars share with Rotarians and others the experiences that led to a greater understanding of their host country. Notably one of the 7 international centres for the program is based here at the University of Qld.

Rotary is organised into districts and our own district, which encompasses parts of Qld, Solomon Islands, PNG, and Nauru, has made a significant impact. Not only has it produced 2 Rotary World Presidents, but each of them has made a profound impact on addressing the issues of health and education.

For example, Clem Renouf, of the Nambour Club was the driving Power behind the Polio Plus program which in 25 years has reduced polio to a mere few hundred new cases a year in Uganda, Ethiopia and India. To do this Rotary raised \$US800Million and continues the fight to this day, with the hope of wiping this disease out completely. Meanwhile, Glen Kinross, of the Hamilton Club, then initiated the worldwide program to increase Numeracy & Literacy.

So what is it about Rotary that allows this to be achieved. Well, Rotary is a worldwide organization of business, professional and community leaders. Around the world there are 1,210,047 Rotarians in 32,774 clubs and 34,000 Rotarians in 1164 clubs in Australia. Clubs are non-political, non-religious, and open to all cultures, races and creeds and yet driven by the common goal of Service above Self. This international network of people, which understand the particular local needs, provides a local presence in nearly all countries leading to a richly rewarding environment, in which members and clubs have the opportunity to 'pay it forward' and have a positive impact wherever they choose.

Thus, the magic of Rotary is that it allows ordinary people to achieve the most extraordinary things. Not only that, Rotary allows members to develop business networking opportunities and building lifelong friendships. Rotarians experience personal growth in an organization that is respected worldwide for its high values and standards.

This Ladies & Gentlemen is the organisation that I invite you to become part of, and make your skills and professional knowledge available. As an afterthought, you will also have fun and enjoy good fellowship.
